Tibetan refugees in exile

In 1950 the Chinese People's Liberation Army began its occupation of what was until then the independent state of Tibet. For nine years the Tibetans sought to find a peaceful co-existence. But the Tibetan revolution started when in March 1959 the Chinese attempted to kidnap the Dalai Lama to take him to Beijing. The Tibetan head of state managed to flee Tibet and from the day more than 100,000 men and women, monks and nuns, farmers and nomads, adults and children have followed his example and his path into exile.

Today approximately 17,000 children and teenagers are growing up in nine Tibetan Children's Villages in India and Nepal. They are children who have fled Tibet alone and on foot or have been born in exile as children of refugees. By supporting these Tibetan children and adolescents in exile, by helping to provide for their basic needs, such as giving them a roof over their heads, healthy nutrition and education, Shelter 108 also pursues its long-term objective of preserving Tibetan culture.

Sponsorships

We arrange sponsorships for Tibetan children and teenagers who were forced to flee their home country or were born in exile. Since 2009 we have been able to find more than 600 sponsorships*. Our sponsorship expert, Michael Landwehr, worked as a teacher in the Tibetan Children's Village of Dharamsala for more than two years. There he got to know firsthand the everyday life of Tibetan children in exile and the problems that go with it.

Shelter 108 e.V. organises educational tours and holiday trips to Nepal and Ladakh for children with psychological disorders and learning difficulties. Each Tibetan child represents a small spark of hope against the demise of the Tibetan culture. This is why our support for each child does not stop when he or she finishes school. For our hostel in Dolpo, Nepal, we are financing a trust for the further education of 15 young Dolpo Tibetans. In the long run we envisage the establishment of grants and scholarships for Tibetan school-leavers in order to provide a bright and meaningful future for them.
